

Daybreak Branch Net Zero

After two years of tracking energy production and consumption, the County Library's Daybreak branch was certified as the first Net Zero Energy building in Utah. Net Zero buildings generate their own renewable energy while minimizing energy consumption, resulting in reduced carbon footprint and cost savings for Salt Lake County.

Kids Late Fees

Starting April 11, 2024, the County Library stopped assessing overdue fines on items categorized as books, music, or movies for kids and teens. Now families can spend time exploring new worlds, characters, and adventures instead of spending money!

Next Level



Branch Anniversary

The Whitmore branch celebrated 50 years as a community hub with historical photographs and reminders of what libraries were like decades ago. In addition to embracing cutting-edge technology of the time, Whitmore was also the administrative headquarters for the system. The Whitmore branch welcomes around 15,000 visitors every month, and circulated more than 700,000 items in 2024.





So Long **Kids Late Fees**




